Tobacco-Free Youth campaign launched at Tawang



TAWANG, October 4: A 60-day Tobacco-Free Youth Campaign for Tawang district was officially launched on October this morning, by the in-charge Deputy Commissioner of Tawang, Sang Khandu, at Dorjee Khandu Government College, Tawang. The event was organized by the District Tobacco Control Cell (DTCC) and was attended by key figures, including DDSE Hridhar Phuntsok, Principal of DKGCT Dr. Yeshi Gyesen, Programme Officer of DTCC Dr. Sangey Thinlay, faculty members, students, and DTCC officials.

Dr. Sangey Thinlay outlined the campaign's objectives, which include raising awareness about the harmful effects of tobacco, promoting tobacco-free educational institutions, strengthening the enforcement of the COTPA Act, and creating tobacco-free villages throughout the district.

Addressing the students, DDSE Hridhar Phuntsok emphasized the importance of valuing life and urged students to use their time wisely. He encouraged them to take responsibility by spreading awareness about the dangers of intoxicants, thereby contributing to a healthier society.

In his remarks, Deputy Commissioner Sang Khandu highlighted the significance of the anti-tobacco pledge. He emphasized that by signing the pledge, students are taking on the responsibility to help free society from the harmful effects of tobacco and other substances. He also noted the important role students play in guiding future generations.

Following the speeches, the in-charge Deputy Commissioner inaugurated the campaign by signing the pledge board, along with other attendees.

Risk of GLOF from Jerjang Lake low: DDMA team



TAWANG, September 30: The risk of a Glacial Lake Outburst Flood (GLOF) from the Jerjang Lake in Tawang district appears to be low.

This was stated by a five-member team, which conducted a preliminary study of the lake and its potential for GLOF on 29 September.

The team constituted by Tawang District Disaster Management Authority (DDMA) conducted assessments along with the collection of rock and soil samples.

They spent around two hours studying the lake's characteristics, including its depth, volume, the width of the discharge channel, flow velocity, slope from the lake outlet, embankment width and water turbidity.

It was observed by the team that in the event of a GLOF from Jerjang Lake, areas such as Brokenthang, Zemithang Gorsam, Baptingkhong and Namtseling along with Army and SSB, ITBP camps etc, near Namka (Chu) could be severely impacted due to the high velocity of the water flow.

The time it would take for floodwaters and debris to reach these areas is estimated to be very short due to high velocity of the flow of the discharge water.

"However, as of the current assessment, the risk of a GLOF event from Jerjang Lake appears to be low. The embankment is natural with a thickness ranging from 30 to 40 meters, and the distance from the lake's outlet to the nearest gradient is approximately 100 meters," they said.

The team, comprising Zemithang circle officer D. Mara, DDM deputy director D. Khandu, SDE CWC Jitendra Kadwa, WRD AE N. Likha and trek leader-cum-photography expert Jambey Dondu completed the expedition and returned to Dhaula camp the same day.

PRELIMINARY NOTIFICATION

ISSUED UNDER SECTION 11 [1] OF THE RIGHT TO FAIR COMPENSATION AND TRANSPARENCY IN LAND ACQUISITION, REHABILITATION AND RESETTLEMENT ACT, 2013

WHEREAS, the power and function of the appropriate authority under the Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act, 2013 vest in the Governor of Arunachal Pradesh which shall be exercised and discharged by him within the state.

WHEREAS, the requiring body i.e., National Highways & Infrastructure Development Corpn. Ltd. (NHIDCL) has sent a requisition vide letter No.NHIDCL/PMU-DBRG/NH-515 (Pkg-3VLA/2022/I (1V547 Dated 01.08.2023 for acquisition of land to an extent of 1.99 Ha for Widening/Improvement of 04 (Four) lane with paved shoulder from Km 55 + 000 to Km 82 + 514 of NH-515 at Oyan, East Siang District, Arunachal Pradesh.

WHEREAS, it appears to the Governor of Arunachal Pradesh that land is likely to be needed at the locality more fully described in the schedule below for Widening/Improvement of 04 (Four) lane with paved shoulder from Km 55 + 000 to Km 82 + 514 of NH-515 at Oyan located at East Siang District, Arunachal Pradesh. It is hereby notified that land in the locality /localities in the schedule below is likely to be acquired for the above said purpose at expenses of requiring body. The Deputy Commissioner, East Siang District, Pasighat vide letter No.ESD/LM/D78-(A)/2020 Dated 9th Sept'2024 has forwarded a certificate that no SIA is required for this land acquisition as there is no displacement of human settlement since it is a linear project on existing NH-515.

NOW THEREFORE, this notification is made under the provisions of section - 11 (1) of the Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act 2013 and to all whom so ever it may concern.

The Governor of Arunachal Pradesh hereby also authorizes the officers and officials for the time being engage for the said purpose with their servant and workman to enter upon and survey any land and to do all other acts in pursuance of the provision of section 12 of the above said Act.

Under section- 11 (4) of the Act, no person shall make any transaction or cause any transaction of land i.e. sale/purchase/gift, specified in the preliminary notification or create any encumbrances on such land from the date of publication of the notification without prior approval of the collector.

Any person interest in the said land and whom so ever has any objection to the acquisition of the said land, may within 30 (Thirty) days from the date of publication of this notification provided under section-15 of the Act, file such objection in writing before the Deputy Commissioner, East Siang District, Arunachal Pradesh.

The plan of the land may be inspected at the Land Management Branch, DCs office, Pasighat, East Siang District, Arunachal Pradesh.

Detox mind for good mental health & wholistic well-being: Let's make it a global priority in the workplace

(Celebrating World Mental Health Day -10th October)

"Health is the supreme foundation of virtue, wealth, enjoyment and salvation.

Diseases are destroyers of health, of good life, and even of life itself".

This statement was made by Charaka, one of the oldest physicians of India, about 2500 years ago; a statement that rings true for all time. Extending the concept of health, he observed significantly, "Life is spoken of as the union of the body, mind and spirit that support animation, flux and the link between the past life and the future". The World Health Organization (WHO) defines health as "a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity." This implies that mental health should not be neglected in our quest to attain good health. With this principle in mind, WHO has designated 10th October as World Mental Health Day to raise awareness for mental health and drive a positive change for everyone's mental health.

Mental health is essential to our overall well-being and as important as physical health. When we feel mentally well, we can work productively, enjoy our free time and contribute actively to our communities. In recent years, there has been increasing acknowledgement of the important role mental health plays in achieving global development goals, as illustrated by the inclusion of mental health in the Sustainable Development Goals. That's why 'Mental Health and Well-being' is a part of the 17 Sustainable Development Goals. It comes under SDG goal 3 that not only focuses on physical health, but mental health as well. As per the goal, the target is to reduce one-third premature mortality from non-communicable diseases through prevention and treatment and promote 'Mental Health and Well-Being' by 2030.

What Is The Importance of World Mental Health Day?

World Health Organisation(WHO) states globally, around 280 million people of all ages suffer from depression, whereas around 1 in 5 of the world's children and adolescents have a mental disorder and it is the leading cause of suicide among 15-29-year-olds. People with severe mental health conditions die prematurely – as much as two decades early – due to preventable physical conditions. It further adds that mental, neurological disorders make up 10% of the global burden of disease and 30% of non-fatal disease burden. Globally, "Such alarming statistics call for awareness to be raised about depression and anxiety," Dr Isaac said. The Global Burden of Disease study estimated that nearly 200 million people in India have experienced a mental disorder, nearly half of whom suffer

from depressive or anxiety disorders. India accounts for more than a third of the female suicides globally, nearly a fourth of all male suicides, and suicide has been the leading cause of death in young Indians.

- Globally, one in seven 10-19-year-olds experiences a mental disorder, accounting for 13% of the global burden of disease in this age group.

- Depression, anxiety and behavioural disorders are among the leading causes of illness and disability among adolescents.

- Suicide is the fourth leading cause of death among 15-29 year-olds.

- The consequences of failing to address adolescent mental health conditions extend to adulthood, impairing both physical and mental health and limiting opportunities to lead fulfilling lives as adults.

According to the National Health program by the Ministry of health and family welfare, 6% of Kerala's population has mental disorders. 1 in a 5 has some emotional and behavioural problems. Close to 60 to 70 million people in the country suffer from common and severe mental disorders. India is the world's suicide capital with over 2.6 lakh cases of suicide in a year. WHO statistics say the average suicide rate in India is 10.9 for every lakh people.

WHO estimates that the burden of mental health problems in India is 2443 Disability-Adjusted Life Years (DALYs) per 10000 populations; the age-adjusted suicide rate per 100000 population is 21.1. The economic loss due to mental health conditions, between 2012-2030, is estimated at USD 1.03 trillion.

The latest survey by India's National Institute of Mental Health and Neurosciences (NIMHANS) found that nearly 150 million Indians are in need of mental health care services, but fewer than 30 million are seeking care. "Over 10% of the population has diagnosable mental health or substance use disorder. Mental health is paramount, and getting treatment for mental disorders is not a luxury but a necessity," Pratima Murthy, director of NIMHANS, told

Statistics show that 1 in every 5 individuals suffers from some form of mental health illness symptoms. 50% of mental health conditions begin by age 14 and 75% of mental health conditions develop by age 24.

Ministry of Family and Health survey also states that in India, one in every 12 elderly persons have symptoms of depression. One out of every two employees in corporate India suffers from anxiety and depression. An increase in alcohol consumption is another area of concern for mental health experts. Statistics report that 20% of 15-49 year-olds has increased

their alcohol consumption during the pandemic.

The idea of celebrating World Mental Health Day took ground and created in 1992 by the World Federation of Mental Health led by the then deputy secretary-general, Richard Hunter. They didn't have a precise objective other than to advocate for mental health as a whole. To say the least, it was an uphill climb to change a plethora of bad and dangerous habits that were making a difficult situation worse for people. The world had a host of mental health issues that weren't properly being treated due to an overall ignorance in regards to what mental health actually is. The WFMH knew that they needed to act on a global scale to solve a global crisis.

The first World Mental Health Day theme was 'Improving the Quality of Mental Health Services throughout the World' in 1994. 27 countries sent feedback reports after the campaign and there were national campaigns in Australia and England. Continuing this momentum, WFMH board members across the globe arranged events in accordance with the day and its growing popularity among government departments, organizations, and civilians alike. This day provides an opportunity to come together and act together for mental health issues that is currently affecting the world and ensures people are able to enjoy good mental health.

What Is The Theme of World Mental Health Day 2024 ?

Every year, the World Health Organisation marks October 10 as the World Mental Health Day, for global mental health education, awareness and advocacy against social stigma with the overall objective to raise awareness about mental health issues around the world and to mobilize efforts in support of mental health. The Day provides an opportunity for all stakeholders working on mental health issues to talk about their work, and what more needs to be done to make mental health care a reality for people worldwide.

The theme for this year's World Mental Health Day is "Mental Health at Work." In collaboration with its partners, the World Health Organisation (WHO) is emphasising the crucial link between mental health and the workplace. Safe, supportive work environments play a protective role in maintaining mental well-being.

Chosen through a global vote involving WFMH members, stakeholders, and supporters, this year's theme, "It is Time to Prioritize Mental Health in the Workplace", is a call to action that resonates worldwide. With over 2000 participants from 116 countries, the selection process was truly inclusive, and the resulting theme reflects the awareness of an urgent need and

profound opportunity.

It further states that many people with a mental illness do not receive the treatment that they are entitled to and deserve. Together with their families and caregivers continue to experience stigma and discrimination. This Day is an opportunity for organisations to raise awareness and funds for their work, for people to reach out to one another and call for change. "We need to act, and act urgently."
